

WHAT IS THE SOURCE WATER ASSESSMENT AND PROTECTION PROGRAM (SWAP)?

1986 amendments to Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA)

- Wellhead Protection Program for ground water
- Delineations and Inventories for all PWSs

1996 SDWA amendments

- Added surface water for "Source Water Assessment and Protection"
- Susceptibility for all PWSs



GOAL OF THE SWAP PROGRAM

- To protect the drinking water source from future contamination
- Ensure a Sustainable Source
- Prevention costs less than cleanup




Decreased Pollution = Less Treatment = Lower Costs



ASSESSMENT REPORT VS. PROTECTION PLAN

Assessment Report

- Susceptibility Analysis
- Delineation
- Potential Contaminant Source Inventory
- Prepared by Ohio EPA or System



Protection Plan

- Prepared after Assessment Report
- To do list / Protective Strategies
- Prepared by System







SWAP PROGRAM

Assessment Report Requirements

- OAC 3745-87-03(B)(6) (click here)
- Required to review annually
- Evaluate every 5 year for revisions

Protection Plan Requirements

- OAC 3745-91-10 (click here)
- Must have a protection plan within 2 years of approval of a new well/intake



SUBSTANTIAL IMPLEMENTATION

- Tracked in the Safe Drinking Water
 Information System (SDWIS)
- Three-year cycle (2025-2027)
- Only sent to community systems
- Endorsed protection plans: unique survey


- 51% of community systems are implementing, which represents

GRANTS – OPENING NOVEMBER

Protective Strategies Grant

 Support the implementation of specific and measurable protective strategies to help protect source water

Well Abandonment Grant

 Provides resources for the planning and proper plugging of abandoned drinking





PROTECTIVE STRATEGY GRANT

- Website creation/updates
- Educational materials
- Sand tank/watershed models
- Signage
- Spill kits/spill containment booms
- Early warning GW monitoring wells
- Semi-permanent SW quality monitoring
- Implementation of BMPs in the corridor management zone





ACTION PLAN

- Update protection plan template/review criteria
- Continually revising our substantial implementation survey process
- Increased statewide outreach
- Continued funding for SWAP



APPENDIX D: CONTINGENCY PLANNING EXAMPLES

Short-Term Source:

Bottled Water, Hauled, Connection w/another community (purchased), High Enough Storage Capacity, etc.

Long-Term Source:

Tying into a Community, New Well Field, Storage Capacity Increase, etc.

Future Water Supply Increases:

Expand Well Field, New Well Field, Re-locate an intake, New Well, Add a Reservoir, Secure Undeveloped Land, Increase Capacity, etc.



APPENDIX E: SOURCE WATER MONITORING EXAMPLES

Things to Monitor:

Nitrates, VOCs, Radiological, Bacteria, Pesticides/Herbicides, Turbidity, Dissolved Oxygen, Harmful Algal Blooms (HABs), PFAS, Other chemicals or Pathogens

Monitoring Equipment/Types:

Routine Sampling (GW – Ambient, Ohio EPA Requirements; SW- Secchi Disks, phyto nets, Microscope, etc.) Ground Water Monitoring Wells, Data Sonde, Acoustic Doppler Velocimeter, Water Level Sensors, Flurometers

Water Quality Monitoring Sources:

NPDES permits, 319 projects, USGS, Total Maximum Daily Load Reports (TMDL), Soil and Water Conservation Districts, Universities, Regulated Sites
